# Take a Look at Sea Grant's Best from 2022!



The annual #BestofSeaGrant campaign highlights some of Sea Grant's coolest stories and most impactful work from the year. Check out a few of our most memorable moments:

- This July, **Guam Sea Grant** achieved status as a <u>Sea Grant Institutional Program</u>. Since then, Guam Sea Grant has been able to increase contributions to the Sea Grant network and enhance the practical use and conservation of Guam's marine and coastal resources.
- Through the <u>Faces of Resiliency video series</u>, <u>Georgia Sea Grant</u> explored how communities that
  are on the front lines of sea level rise, storm surge and flooding are responding to these
  challenges by identifying solutions that protect infrastructure and coastal habitats.
- The Northeast Sea Grant Consortium, in partnership with NOAA and DOE, funded six projects to advance social science and technology <u>research on offshore renewable energy</u> in the Northeast United States.
- **Wisconsin Sea Grant** launched <u>The Water We Swim In</u>, a new podcast series on water equity in the Great Lakes, featuring inspiring stories from the community organizers, researchers and leaders navigating Wisconsin's waters.
- New Hampshire Sea Grant helped <u>raise awareness about invasive green crabs</u> and the developing fishery and local businesses that are tackling the problem.
- At Sea Grant Week in September, Lake Champlain Sea Grant was awarded the Sea Grant
   Association Research-to-Application Award for research on an innovative wastewater treatment
   method, which not only found that the method was successful but also inspired further
   investment, South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium was awarded the Superior Outreach
   Programming Award for a continuing education series that teaches real estate professionals how
   to educate their clients about best practices for living in a coastal environment, and Washington
   Sea Grant was awarded the Excellence in Communication Award for their 50th anniversary

communications campaign.

## Sea Grant Announces \$1.2 Million in Support of 2022 American Lobster Research Program

In November, Sea Grant announced \$1.2 million in support of Sea Grant's American Lobster Research Program to continue addressing emergent needs and priorities associated with this important fishery. Pursuant to congressional direction, this year's funded projects shift focus on operational needs, specifically related to gear technology implementation, research and adoption.

### Sea Grant Advances Investigation of Contaminants of Emerging Concern

In December, Sea Grant announced newly funded projects that aim to enhance research and monitoring efforts for contaminants of emerging concern, like pharmaceuticals, cleaning products and microfibers, while strengthening strategies to reduce their presence in aquatic environments. Sea Grant's work in contaminants of emerging concern is supported in part by congressional direction and appropriations from fiscal years 2022 and 2021.

<u>Sea Grant Career Opportunities</u> Sea Grant has several job openings across the country, such as Aquaculture Research & Outreach Specialist with California Sea Grant, Resilience Extension Associate with Minnesota Sea Grant, Coastal Water Resources Extension Educator with Oregon Sea Grant and Resilience and Adaptation Specialist with Washington Sea Grant.

<u>State Sea Grant Program Funding Opportunities</u> State Sea Grant Programs provide funding opportunities for a variety of topics within Sea Grant's strategic priorities. <u>NMFS- Sea Grant Joint Fellowship Program</u> The NMFS-Sea Grant Joint Fellowship Program in Population and Ecosystem Dynamics and Marine Resource Economics places Ph.D. students in research-based fellowships that provide support for up to three years. Applications are due to Sea Grant programs by January 25, 2023.

2023 NOAA Coastal Management Fellowship Program NOAA is recruiting candidates for the 2023 Coastal Management Fellowship Program. This program's mission is to provide on-the-job education and training opportunities in coastal resource management and policy for postgraduate students and to provide project assistance to state coastal zone management agencies. Application packages must be submitted to the Sea Grant office in the state where you received your degree by January 27, 2023.

<u>Knauss Marine Policy Fellowship Program</u> The Sea Grant Knauss Fellowship provides a unique educational and professional experience to graduate students who have an interest in ocean, coastal and Great Lakes resources and in the national policy decisions affecting those resources. Applications must be submitted to state Sea Grant programs by **February 16, 2023**.

**2022 National Coastal Resilience Fund Recipients** NOAA and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation are pleased to announce the grant recipients for the 2022 National Coastal Resilience Fund. The initiative advances regionally identified priorities and innovative approaches, and will invest \$136 million in 88 projects designed to strengthen the natural infrastructure that protects coastal communities and enhances fish and wildlife habitat in 29 states and territories. **2023 NOAA B-WET Grant Competitions** The NOAA Bay Watershed Education and Training (B-WET) program has grant competitions open now. The B-WET program is an environmental education grant program that promotes place-based experiential learning for K-12 students and related professional development for teachers. Applications Open for William M. Lapenta NOAA Student Internship Program The Lapenta Internship is open to students who have just completed their sophomore year through advanced doctoral degrees. The program provides a stipend of \$6,000 per year, travel to/from the host site and housing. This internship program enables NOAA's National Weather Service, Office of Oceanic and Atmospheric Research, National Environmental Satellite Data and Information Service, National Marine Fisheries Service, National Ocean Service and Office of Marine and Aviation Operations to develop the skills needed in their future workforce. Deadline for applications is January 5, 2023.

2023 NOAA Small Business Innovation Research Funding Opportunity NOAA invites qualified small businesses to submit proposals for research and development of highly innovative technologies that have strong commercial potential and fit within the NOAA mission areas. To be eligible to submit a Phase I application, small businesses must submit a required Letter of Intent via this form by January 13, 2023.

<u>Art x Climate Call for Artists</u> The U.S. Global Change Research Program invites artists to engage in the development of the Fifth National Climate Assessment by creatively visualizing climate change in the United States: its causes, impacts, and manifestations; our shared vulnerabilities; and the strength of our collective response. Selected art submissions will be featured in the Fifth National Climate Assessment as

<u>Applications Open for NOAA Office of Education 2023 Undergraduate Scholarships</u> Applications are open for both NOAA's Ernest F. Hollings and José E. Serrano EPP/MSI undergraduate scholarships. <u>Gulf Ecosystem Initiative Call for Proposals</u> The Gulf Ecosystem Initiative is a partnership between the National Center for Ecological Analysis and Synthesis and the NOAA RESTORE Science program to fund synthesis science and postdoctoral research. Working groups of scientists and decision makers will collaborate to solve pressing questions across the Gulf of Mexico. Applications are due January 31, 2023.

U.S. DOT Announces Funding Opportunity for Culvert Removal, Replacement and Restoration The U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration has opened applications for the FY2022 Notice of Funding Opportunity for the National Culvert Removal, Replacement and Restoration Grant Program (Culvert Aquatic Organism Passage Program). This annual competitive grant program awards grants to eligible entities for projects that replace, remove and repair culverts or weirs to meaningfully improve or restore fish passage for anadromous fish. Deadline for applications is February 6, 2023.

<u>Picture Climate Change Photo Contest</u> NOAA has launched the "Picture Climate Change" student photo contest and is looking for images showing climate change in the United States. This photo contest is a chance for students to showcase their climate change experience through the lens of a camera, and to provide a short written narrative. <u>Details available here</u>. Submissions due **February 15, 2023**.

<u>Framing the National Nature Assessment</u> A Federal Register notice was released announcing a request to submit comments to inform the framing, development, and use of the National Nature Assessment. USGCRP is seeking input from the public on the definition of nature, what questions the assessment can help answer, potential audiences and engagement processes, trends and projections, and relevant information sources. The call for information will be open through **March 31, 2023**.



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
