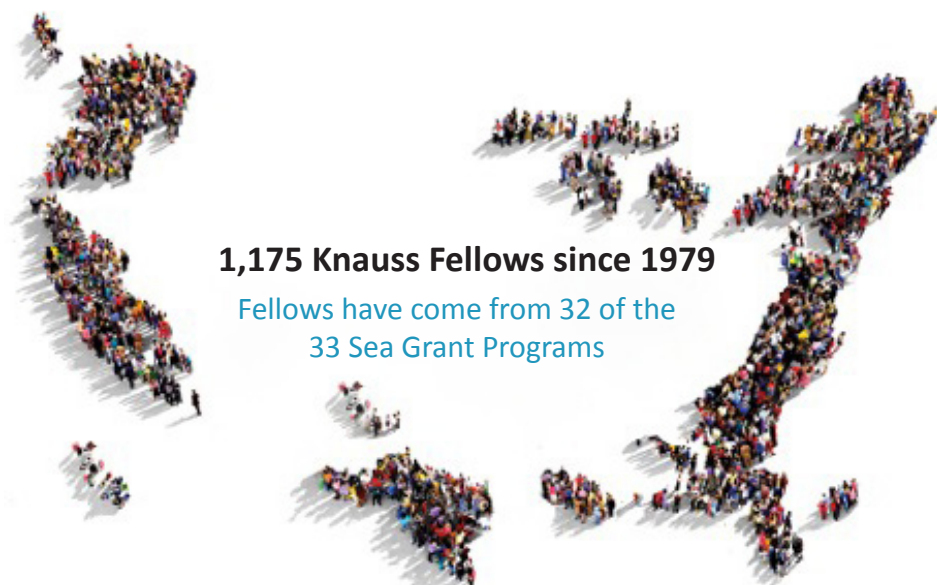

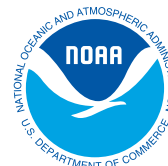
DAN ASHE
